

What is COAP?

The Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Program (COAP) is a program designed to help individuals with opioid use sustain drug free lives through decreasing barriers, providing treatment, resources, and ongoing support.

Whether an individual has insurance or not, COAP will pay the remaining costs for inpatient, MAT, and outpatient treatment.

This program is completely voluntary.

DeKalb County Court Services believes that everyone has the right and ability to make positive changes in their lives and believes that COAP gives you the best chance to make these changes.

Your Responsibilities

Appointments

Participants are expected to meet regularly with the COAP Coordinator and may be subject to random drug tests.

Treatment

Different types of treatment will be recommended based on your assessments and progress in the program at no cost to you.

Who Is Eligible

- Individuals with current use or documented history of using Opioids
- Individuals who have current DeKalb County cases or Violations
- Individuals interested in receiving treatment and support services
- Individuals with Medicaid, Private Insurance, and No Insurance
- Individuals who are at Moderate or High Risk for potential recidivism and/or addiction.



The Process

The first step is to participate in a Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Program (COAP) Risk Assessment. The Court Services COAP Coordinator will interview you and complete an assessment to determine if you're eligible.

If eligible for COAP, the next step is to complete a Substance Abuse Assessment to determine the level of treatment you may need.

For participants who have no insurance, the COAP Coordinator will assist you in applying for Medicaid; however, COAP will still pay for services whether you are approved or denied.

During your time in COAP, all of your court cases will remain open.

If you successfully complete the treatment recommendations given by COAP, the Courts will be notified and your progress will be taken into consideration during sentencing.

If you do not successfully complete the treatment recommendations given by COAP, the Courts will be notified.
